From the Principal's Desk

Kia Ora

I feel passionate about Menzies College, its students, their families and the wider school community and nothing could have 'hurt' me more than the piece of reckless journalism on the front page of Tuesday's Southland Times. This was written by a journalist who I had to explain, in the company of other principals after last year's reporting, how to present NCEA data and the dangerous comparison of schools that have different roll numbers and decile rankings. We have been singled out for being below the national average in all three NCEA levels based on 1 July roll numbers. My understanding of maths is that half the schools in New Zealand will always be under or over the national average and I have tried to explain to people that every student that passes or fails in NCEA moves our data by between 3% and 5% pending on the size of their year level. At a school with over 300 Year 11 students this would be around 0.3% and given that the average shows the majority of students pass, this will generally have a more favourable outcome.

The commentary by the journalist in singling out three schools for being below the national average shows little understanding of how the data is to be interpreted. We have students who leave after the 1 July and will never sit the exam, we have special needs students included in that data who we allow to attempt a paper or two. Last year, we had an international student from Germany who attempted and passed a couple of papers. Students shift in and out of the area all the time. No student in our school is excluded from attempting exams. Where was the comment that Menzies College outperformed a large Invercargill single sex school in 'Participation' at both Level 2 and 3? Or, a very large co-ed city school in Level 3 and equal to it in Level 2? Last year we also had a major increase in the number of endorsements at the Merit and Excellence level at both the subject and course level. These were results with quality and had meaning for those who achieved them.

We welcome students of all abilities to our school and having tried to place an excluded student in several other schools last month and being rung about a girl that had shifted to town, I get the impression that if these students are not going to bring positive NCEA results, some schools are not interested. We are above that and want to shape every student to be the best they can while in our care and allow them to experience school in an enjoyable but challenging manner.

As I have inferred, it is unwise to compare data and figures can be screwed around to suit any argument. I am extremely proud of the difference the staff and community make for our students and know that this is a fantastic school.

If I'm feeling a bit 'hurt' by this then I need to look back no further than last Friday afternoon and recall the outstanding performance of our students in their House dramas. Using the theme of 'Feeling Safe, Striving for Excellence and Showing Respect', these were brilliant and left us all feeling good about who we are and what can be achieved.

All the best to our Year 12 and 13 students who head to Wanaka for four days next week as part of the Outdoor Experience programme. Also to Charday Deans as she takes on Outward Bound for the next 21 days.

Next Thursday, 17 April we will be holding our ANZAC assembly from 2.30pm. This is a special assembly focused on those who served. It will be led by our Literacy group students from Years 9 and 10. All members of the school community are welcome to attend we would love your company.

PISA


For those following the PISA sample questions we have been putting in each week, here is the answer to last week's question (Level 4) and the Level 5 question. Are you smarter than a 15 year old?

New Zealand was 15th for the Level 4 question with 32% of candidates answering correctly – you will be noticing that the percentage correct figure is dropping pretty dramatically as the questions get harder!

Last week's Question:

Question 4 (Level 4):

A revolving door includes three wings which rotate within a circular-shaped space. The inside diameter of this space is 2 metres (200 centimetres). The three door wings divide the space into three equal sectors. The plan below shows the door wings in three different positions viewed from the top.



The door makes 4 complete rotations in a minute. There is room for a maximum of two people in each of the three door sectors. What is the maximum number of people that can enter the building through the door in 30 minutes?

- A. 60
- B. 180
- C. 240
- D. 720

This week's Question (not multichoice this time!): Level 5

Climbing Mount Fuji

Mount Fuji is a famous dormant volcano in Japan.



The Gotemba walking trail up Mount Fuji is about 9 kilometres (km) long. Walkers need to return from the 18 km walk by 8 pm. Toshi estimates that he can walk up the mountain at 1.5 kilometres per hour on average, and down at twice that speed. These speeds take into account meal breaks and rest times.

Using Toshi's estimated speeds, what is the latest time he can begin his walk so that he can return by 8 pm?

Literacy Week Round-Up

During Week nine we celebrated literature with the annual event : Literacy Week. The Year 13 students did themselves and us proud as they talked over the intercom system about their favourite books.

On Tuesday the 1st April our students were fortunate enough to listen to world renowned poet Cilla McQueen. McQueen was the New Zealand Poet Laureate for 2009 – 2011, she has published ten books of poetry, and won the New Zealand Book Award for Poetry three times. She currently lives in Bluff and has a new book out very soon. McQueen has had a very busy and colourful life. She has worked with a group of musicians and toured the country putting music to her poetry. The group called themselves Bad Bananas and had an amazing time experimenting with different artistic mediums. In 1985 and 1986 she received the Robert Burns Fellowship at Otago University which allowed her to write poetry and get paid, a bit of a novelty for a writer! She travelled to Germany and visited both East and West Berlin and as a result wrote a diary which was turned in to a book of poems.

As a speaker Cilla McQueen was wonderful to listen to. She adapted her content to suit the year groups and managed to both entertain and enlighten our students. She read a number of her poems, including The Rope, Quark Dance and Otherwise. McQueen has a broad scope of knowledge, spreading into science, language and art and all of these are evident in her poetry. Being able to listen to her speak about her life, the life of a poet and read her poems was a great opportunity for our students and one which we hope will resonate in their minds.

On 13 March I travelled to Auckland where I spent the next 10 days on the Spirit of New Zealand which is a ship owned by the Spirit of Adventure Trust. On the Friday once everyone had arrived, there were 40 nervous trainees on board who hadn't seen or had anything to do with each other before. On the first day we travelled to Kawau Bay (near Auckland) where we stayed in safety for two days while Cyclone Lusi passed through. On the Sunday we travelled to Great Barrier

Island where we stayed four nights. We then came back to Kawau to get closer to Auckland for trainee day. Saturday the 22nd was our last day and it was trainee day where the 40 trainees elected a Captain and crew. The crew then decided the itinerary for the day and we set sail. On trainee day I was lucky enough to be elected as the navigator where I plotted on the chart where we were going and told the Captain if he was sticking to the chart. While on the ship we did a lot of memorable exercises including a tramp to the top of Mount Hudson (Great Barrier Island), sailing the wee lugs, climbing to the top of the mast which is 32m high on a 10m wide boat, working the sails, swinging off the yards, morning swims and much more. My favourite part about the trip was going to the boat by myself to meet 40 strangers and walking away with 40 friends.



I highly rate the Spirit and hope that anyone that gets the opportunity to go, takes it with both hands and has the same experience that I had, because it is truly amazing.

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
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
