This week at assembly I spoke about our school's culture and how it has been shaped by all current and previous students, staff and community members. It is different from other secondary schools and is very much something we own, as we feel it is the best environment for our students learning needs and reflective of community demands.

Our culture is very much based around relationships and this is evident in the way our students across all ages, relate to others and display the expectations that have become embedded over time. We are fortunate that as a school we have such a positive connection with our wider community who support us through so much of what we do. Our success will rely upon an open triangulated relationship between home, staff and the student as we all strive to uphold the three values of PB4L.

At the first assembly Dr Wilkinson and Jamie Ranstead presented an entertaining and very informative summary of PB4L and especially what 'Feeling Safe' looks and feels like. Super Seniors
